MBBS STUDENTS COMPLETE FIRST COMMUNITY HEALTH FIELD POSTING



he 300-level MBBS students of the Federal University of Health Sciences, Ila-Orangun have successfully concluded their first Community Health Field Posting, which took place from August 25 to September 12, 2025.

The one-month programme marked a significant milestone in the University's commitment to producing well-rounded medical professionals equipped with strong communityoriented healthcare experience.

Throughout the posting, the students were divided into four groups of 34 members each and assigned to various primary health care centres within Ila-Orangun, including Adekunle Community Health Centre, Ita Obajoko Community Primary Health Centre, and two other designated centres. The exercise provided practical exposure to primary healthcare operations, health education, and community diagnosis while promoting direct interaction with grassroots health systems.

To mark the end of the programme, an evaluation and closing ceremony was held on September 18, 2025, during which each group was assessed based on specific performance criteria. The event featured detailed presentations and reports from the groups, showcasing their findings, experiences, and recommendations for improving community health services.



FUHSI TRAINS CLEANING STAFF AND HEALTH ATTENDANTS ON HYGIENE, WASTE MANAGEMENT, AND SUSTAINABILITY

FUHSI STUDENTS COMMENCE CLINICAL POSTING AT UNIVERSITY OF ILORIN TEACHING HOSPITAL

The clinical posting for students of the Federal University of Health Sciences, Ila-Orangun officially commenced on September 29, 2025, at the University of Ilorin Teaching Hospital (UITH).

On the first day, the students were taken on a familiarization tour of the hospital to acquaint themselves with the various units and their functions. This was followed by an orientation session with the Heads of the Physiotherapy Department and the Prosthetics and Orthotics Department, where they were enlightened on the importance of their profession in Nigeria's healthcare system and encouraged to uphold excellence in their academic and professional pursuits.

A total of 38 students began the posting and were divided into four groups to rotate across four major units: Prosthetics and Orthotics, Physiotherapy, Orthopedics, and Radiology, with each rotation lasting two weeks. The eight-week clinical posting is designed to expose students to diverse medical conditions and deepen their practical understanding of clinical procedures related to their field.

So far, students have had rich hands-on experiences across the units. In the Prosthetics and Orthotics Unit, they have assisted in the design and fabrication of assistive devices. At the Physiotherapy Unit, they have participated in rehabilitation programs for individuals with cerebral palsy and other mobility-related conditions. The Orthopedics Unit has offered exposure to cases such as osteoarthritis, osteomyelitis, and spondylolisthesis, as well as surgical procedures like tenotomy. Meanwhile, in the Radiology Unit, students have gained practical knowledge of imaging techniques and the role of radiological investigations in patient diagnosis and management. Beyond clinical practice, the students have fostered collaboration through regular knowledge-sharing sessions, discussing the various

medical conditions encountered in their rotations. Living together within the same compound has also encouraged team bonding through extracurricular activities, including games, dance, and social interaction.

CPC - THE COPY, PASTE, COLLAPSE SYNDROME: AI TRAP IN ACADEMIC WRITING



CPC, or *AI-induced Copy, Paste, Collapse* syndrome, is fast emerging as the newest academic malaise, one that is yet to be clinically diagnosed but is already spreading through lecture halls, libraries, and study rooms. It thrives in an age where artificial intelligence promises quick answers and ready-made essays, luring students into a cycle of copying, pasting, and ultimately collapsing under the weight of shallow understanding. Like an undetected virus, CPC erodes critical thinking, creativity, and authentic scholarship, leaving behind a polished façade that masks intellectual emptiness.

Not long ago, a colleague shared a disturbing classroom experience. After assigning a standard term paper, she received a stack of submissions that felt oddly similar, glossy on the surface, yet hollow in substance. When she ran a few through an AI detector, the results were clear: the students hadn't just borrowed help, they had outsourced their thinking.

Welcome to the AI age, where technology meant to enhance learning is fast becoming a shortcut to avoid it. And it's not just the occasional lazy student. The misuse and abuse of AI tools like *ChatGPT*, *Consensus*, *Grammarly*, etc., paraphrasers, and essay generators have become a quiet epidemic across campuses. What once was a smart assistant is now being treated like a ghostwriter. The result? Students are submitting polished work without doing the mental lifting that sharpens their reasoning, argumentation, and originality.

Let's be clear! AI isn't the villain. Used wisely, it's a powerful tool for brainstorming, organising thoughts, and improving clarity. But when students rely on it entirely by copying, pasting, and calling it a day, it becomes a threat to their intellectual growth. Every time a student bypasses the struggle of drafting, researching, and rewriting, they

miss the golden opportunity to build their analytical muscles.

The tragedy is not just about grades or plagiarism charges. It's about stunted development. University isn't just about passing courses; it's about learning how to think. If AI keeps doing the heavy lifting, what happens to curiosity, originality, and critical thought? Are we not raising a generation that may ace their assignments but fail at problem-solving when it truly counts?

As educators and mentors, we must begin to have open conversations with students about responsible AI use. And as students, it's time to reflect: are you using AI to support your learning or to escape it? There's a big difference between guided assistance and total dependency.

Let this be a call to action. Resist the urge to let machines think for you. Struggle a bit. Draft badly. Edit again. Ask questions. That's how you grow.
